Homeschool Corner

Science Isn't Just for Scientists Part 3

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In previous articles we have begun our exploration of the Scientific Method. By now you should understand that the Scientific Method isn't one particular system, but a way of thinking analytically that benefits people in all walks of life. I hope after discussing the first two steps, making observations and asking questions, you have come to realize that science need not be so scary.



As you can see, this leads us to the next step: forming a hypothesis. Hypothesis is just a fancy word meaning educated guess. Students draw on their past experiences, observations, and even intuition to come up with plausible answers to their questions. A hypothesis is typically worded as an "if...then" statement. If a seed is watered, then it will grow. If clouds hold rain and there are clouds in the sky, then it will rain. A hypothesis will lead us from the general to the specific. If the weight of a car effects fuel economy, then lighter cars will use less gas. Congratulations, you have just taught your kids deductive reasoning. A skill they will use whether or not they enter the field of science.

Notice that there are two important qualities about a hypothesis. First, it is testable; an experiment could be set up to test the validity of the statement. Second, it is falsifiable; an experiment could be devised that might reveal that such an idea is not true. If these two qualities are not met, then the question being asked cannot be addressed using the scientific method. It is important to remember that it is the skill of creating a hypothesis which is important here, not accuracy. Young children will come up with hypotheses that we know right

away are not valid. Older students may come up with answers that we need to investigate to determine their validity. Resist the urge to lead your child to the correct answer. The value is in the journey.

As you can see from the chart above, scientific thinking is a process. Questions lead to a hypothesis. Experiments will validate or falsify the hypothesis. Information from the experiment will lead to new questions and/or hypotheses. And the cycle of curiosity and learning continues. In my next article we will enter the not so scary world of the science experiment.

Hidden Curriculum: Using the Newspaper

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Many of us have textbooks in all shapes and sizes ranging from grammar workbooks to encyclopedias stacked in every corner and shelf in our home. Most of these resources have a role to play in the instruction of our learners. There is one resource, however, that is often overlooked. The local newspaper is packed with educational opportunities beyond current events. Newspapers are cost-effective and readily-available. This is a good alternative when textbooks are

being shipped, while traveling, or when a break from the normal books is needed. There are a vast number of activities that can begin with some portion of a newspaper. Here are a few ideas:

- The Classified Section: Jump-start a Life Skills lesson on cost-of-living or budgeting. Students can choose a car, home, and job to see if their choices are realistic.
- Grocery Store mailers (often found in newspapers or in the junk mail pile): Give students a budget for shopping, and have them build a grocery list from the advertisements; Compare product prices; Analyze advertisements for tricks used to lure customers
- Local Events section: What's going on your community? Decide together on an educational event you would like to attend. Make any necessary preparations such as research about the place to be visited or reading a book upon which a play is based.
- Living section: Find recipes to try as a family. Collect them in a binder and write reviews after cooking.
- Puzzles: Many newspapers include crossword, logic, or word puzzles. These can be clipped and placed into a folder for students to work on in the car.
- Photographs: Clip the photographs from the newspaper, and have your student write a caption, journal entry, or creative story that describes the photograph.
- News Stories: Write a persuasive essay about a current event topic; Track a "hot" topic over several weeks of stories to make connections or gain a deeper understanding; Create a "timeline" of the year by making a scrapbook of news stories to mark what occurred in the world over the year; Have your student highlight words that they do not understand and look up the definition (These can be the week's spelling/vocabulary words!); Have students re-write article headlines after reading the story
- Editorial Section: Older students can separate the facts from the opinions by using 2 different colored highlighters or making notes on a folded piece of paper.
- Comic Section: Comics can be a great motivator! Students can create their own comics based on a story they read or change the ending of a newspaper comic.
- Sports Section: Calculate percentages and player averages based on player statistics; Graph a particular player's stats over several weeks; Make predictions about team performances

based on statistics, player injuries, etc...; ■ Business Section: Help students track a stock by investing play money. Older students can research companies before choosing. They can keep a chart of gains and losses. Was it a good investment?

The newspaper is also a helpful source in teaching students how to read graphs and charts, how to include necessary details in writing, and as an introduction to non-fiction reading. The list above is only a brief sampling of how newspapers can be used to supplement curriculum. A newspaper and a little creativity is all you need!

Tran-si-tions

(tran-zish-uhn) "...movement, passage, or change from one stage, concept, state, etc. to another." (Webster's)

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During the 2009-10 school year over 85 new students took the plunge into Homeschooling with River Springs by enrolling in the Transitions program. This year the program more than doubled! So what is Transitions? Think of it as "Homeschool with training wheels." Parents who have never homeschooled their children before, or just need a little extra support and training, are given the opportunity to work with a Transitions ES in a year-long program designed to prepare them to become confident, successful homeschooling parents.

What does this look like? Transitions families are teamed up with an Educational Specialist (ES) who meets with them on a weekly basis at the beginning of the school year. Students use our boxed set curriculum, which provide online lesson plans that coordinate with RSCS selected

curriculum. Each week the ES and parent collaborate to develop the student's lesson plans, and the ES trains the parent how to teach the lessons. Parents also attend certification classes that give them tools for becoming a successful parent-teacher. For instance, our assessment class shows parents how to use formal and informal assessments to determine their student's strengths and weaknesses. Then they can work with the ES to modify weekly lesson plans to meet the student's needs. ESEs also collaborate with parents to identify ways to use community as the classroom, for instance using field trips to support subject-area instruction. One parent in Temecula has a fourth grader going on our "Gold Rush" field trip to Riley's Farm. This is a meaningful way that she chose to support her child's study of California history.

As the year progresses, parents gain confidence and transition from weekly ES meetings to bi-weekly meetings. At the end of the school year, the ES and parent meet to review the year and make sure the parent and student are ready to move into our traditional Homeschool program in the fall. Transitions has become a great way to try out the River Springs Homeschool option in a supported and structured way. So, put on your training wheels for a great adventure!


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Field Trips

Introduction to Business:


The Introduction to Business class at the Temecula Student Center may have only included four students (pictured below), but they accomplished a few phenomenal feats this year. As an in class project during the first semester, they wrote and submitted grant application to NASA that resulted in a \$6,500 grant award to pay for the entry fee and Kit of Parts for the FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Robotic Competition (FRC). During the second semester, they joined the Temecula Student Center Robotics Team, Cyborg Zombies, where they worked collaboratively with teachers and business mentors to develop a Business Plan, plan/develop/order advertising/promotional materials, create a Safety Program, and assist with other business/logistic functions to support the team.



Next year, the Temecula Student Center is expanding our CTE program to include the following:

- Introduction to Business
- Bookkeeping w/Lab (Basic Accounting and Finance)
- Engineering Essentials
- Electrical and Computer Engineering
- Robotics

Engineering Essentials:

The Engineering Essentials class began the school year learning about the engineering design process and then proceeded to use this process, which is very similar to the scientific method, to learn basic engineering technology applications. Each class included a hands-on, project based learning application to provide real-world application of course content. During the course of the year, the students created the Cyborg Zombies – FRC Team 3470. On January 8th, a Kit of Parts was received from FRC that these students used to build a functional robot within six weeks. This extensive project-based learning application included computer programming, structural design/build, pneumatics, electrical and electronic engineering applications.

Cyborg Zombies:

Although the CTE classes created the Cyborg Zombie team, we welcomed team members for the home school community as well as middle school siblings. The team represented themselves well at their first competition obtaining the #3 rookie seed and placing 21 out of 60 registered teams. Due to this placement, the team was on standby as a replacement robot if one of the robots in the championship competition were to be disabled and unable to perform. Alas, this did not happen. School Leadership is very proud of the performance of our Cyborg Zombies.



Medical Office Program

This year the **Medical Office Program**, as a class project for Anatomy and Physiology, constructed human bodies from clay and paper mache. Each year, the Medical Office Academy completes a class project and this year the human bodies project will be on display at our awards ceremony on May 27.



FIELD TRIPS



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
