Colonial Farm Life

Explore the domestic, agricultural, and cultural heritage of Colonial America with hands-on workshops!

Though the years just prior to the American Revolution were certainly full of turmoil, the people of the colonies worked hard and found time for a some fun, too! This tour explores the domestic side of 18th century America and puts students in the shoes of their colonist counterparts in a fun, interactive way.

Activities include quill & ink calligraphy, candle dipping, butter turning, etiquette, weaving, and children's games.

In the 18th century, beautiful handwriting was not only praised but expected. Practice some maxims of the day in long-hand, and work on your very own "John Hancock."



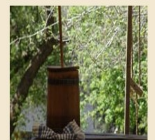
Candle Dipping

Make your own taper-candle to take home with you, learn about the types of waxes used, and be entertained by lore from a time before light-switches.



Butter Making

Churn some sweet cream butter in our Summer Kitchen, learn how our dairy cows are milked and cared for, and gain firsthand knowledge of how to make your own butter at home.



Etiquette

Wool and Flax are the main fibers used to make our clothing. Try your hand at carding wool and using a hand loom.
