
CTE Public Safety 1

The CTE Public Safety pathway prepares students with a broad-based foundational knowledge in careers that involve public safety.


The educational foundation will assist students who wish to pursue related professional training at the postsecondary level. Students will gain *experience* through classroom instruction, *hands-on training*, and *community exercises*. The evolving integration of state public safety organizations, their connections with federal and state intelligence and security agencies, interoperability and coordination of effort, and the shared mission to *protect the public* in a post-9/11 world are areas of emphasis for the pathway. The careers included in this pathway primarily address law enforcement services, homeland and cyber security services, and correctional services.






CTE Public Safety students are showing mastery of industry standards and CITE I Cans through a variety of projects, presen-tations and assessments. After students demonstrate and deliver their standard, they must defend their knowledge during a question and answer period where they make connections to real world situations. Pathfinder student Fulgencio Marguez completed a presentation on Standard A1.1 and student Sabrina Neri from Pathfinder Student Center instructs the class on the Sender-Receiver Model of communication which meets Industry Standard A4.1 - Know the basic techniques and methods of active listening to obtain and clarify information in oral communications.

CTE Public Safety students had the opportunity to listen and ask questions of *California Highway Patrol Officer Lassig* when he visited on October 25th. The topics covered were interdepartmental collaboration for a common goal, the gang task force, and qualifications a person needs to be successful in a law enforcement application process. Officer Lassig provided valuable information that students used towards mastering the Public Safety Industry Standards.

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CTE Public Safety students met at Pathfinder Student Center to join in a presentation by Officer Nguyen of the California Highway Patrol. Officer Nguyen shared his 27+ years of experience with the CHP working as a Patrol Officer, Recruitment/Backgrounds Unit, Auto Theft Division, and a Community Enhancement Officer where he promoted a positive community relationship around neighborhoods and schools. Students asked questions and were able to learn about a variety of jobs within the CHP.





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On November 15th, the CTE Public Safety students had the privilege to have two guest speakers from the Riverside County Search Dog Unit and Bloodhound Tracking Team visit the Temecula Student Center. Mr. Monahan, his dog Marley, Corporal T. Gavin and his dog Copper, demonstrated the technique and skill used in search and rescue operations. Mr. Monahan and Marley have been deployed on over 100 missions with several significant and life saving finds.
