


A trifold, full-color brochure she designed to illustrate the use of technology in marketing (left).


DESIGN, VISUAL, AND MEDIA ARTS PATHWAY:

TEAM OF TALENTED PHOTOGRAPHY STUDENTS ROCK THE PROM!










COMMUNITY AS THE CLASSROOM:

PUBLIC SAFETY - AND FAMILY AND HUMAN SERVICES - IN ACTION!



CTE *Public Safety* students at the *Temecula Student Center* had the opportunity to listen and ask questions of two members of the *Murrieta Police Department* on May 2nd. *Officer Jennifer Metoyer* spoke about the qualifications a person needs to be successful in the law enforcement application process and the dangers of distracted driving. *Ms. Julie Shannon is the lead dispatcher for Murrieta PD*. Ms. Shannon spoke about a career in being an emergency operations dispatcher. *Both Officer Metoyer and Ms. Shannon provided valuable information that students used towards mastering the Public Safety Industry Standards*.

Just recently, I went on a trip to *Sacramento* to see the *State Board of Education* meetings with my mom and other staff at Springs. *We were there to speak at a hearing over Vista Springs Charter Schools being established* after being denied by the San Diego County Board of Education several times. Many different staff members from Springs traveled to Sacramento to petition the State to allow the establishment of Vista Springs and supervise the school.

While in Sacramento, I was given the opportunity to discuss different aspects of why the school should be allowed to function with Springs staff. Two families from La Fuente were also brought with us and made public comments about why the Vista Springs should be allowed to take place. Ultimately, the Board made the decision to allow Vista Springs to establish under the supervision of the California State Board.

I learned so much from this trip. I was given the opportunity to see how decisions are made, both in education and funding. Seeing and understanding how decisions are made in the government was a riveting experience that demonstrated why it's so important to be aware of how the government functions in order to be the citizen I want to be within it. This experience left me better understanding what my internship at Springs in the business department entails and how much work goes into bringing these schools to life.
