
Business Pathway, Medical Pathway & Internships

UC Riverside School of Medicine Field Trip

On April 8th, Annette Butler, the CTE Coordinator of Articulation, Field Trips, and Healthcare Administrative Services Teacher, chaperoned Springs students from the Health Science and Medical Technology Pathway to UC Riverside, School of Medicine. The students learned about program opportunities and eligibility requirements for med school. They also learned about prerequisite



classes and exams, and listened to lectures by the Medical School's Director, current students of the program and graduating physicians. Future plans include the University to visit the Health Science and Medical Technology Pathway students at the Pathfinder, Hemet-Girard and Temecula Student Centers to discuss the costs and dedication required to be a part of the Future Physicians Leadership Program and Mini Medical School at UCR.



At the Hemet-Girard Student Center, CTE Medical Terminology, Medical Coding, and Medical Collections students received a favorite hands-on learning assignment with CTE Teacher, Annette Butler. When learning the cardiovascular system, students chose to visualize and analyze a cow heart for disease and dissection purposes. The students found four blood clots and some adipose tissue on the outer layers. The students identified and named each section, weighed and measured the specimen which proved to be in the correct limits of a healthy heart for a young but grown cow. The students were pleased with their choice of the project and are interested in analyzing/finding disease in other specimens as they learn each organ system.

CTE Medical Pathway Student Standouts - Aubrey Florentin & Timothy Sanchez





SkillsUSA State Championships 2017: River Springs Charter, Our First Competition Season

SkillsUSA, a nationwide career technical student organization (CTSO) annually hosts competitive conferences for students across every US state and territory. The organization currently boasts nearly 400,000 student and professional members, 21,000 in California alone, and 450 of which belong to River Springs Charter School. SkillsUSA is proud to host over 120 contests that represent 15 different industry sectors. The main elements of SkillsUSA include a three-part framework combining personal, workplace, and technical skills that are grounded in academics. Celebrating its 50th anniversary in California this year, SkillsUSA once again held the conference in San Diego at the Town and Country Resort.



Six students from River Springs, representing the Temecula and Pathfinder student centers, traveled to San Diego to attend the four-day long SkillsUSA State and Leadership Conference, also known as State Championships. These students are 1st year members of our newly established chapter of SkillsUSA at River Springs, coordinated by CTE Business Management Pathway instructor and four-year SkillsUSA advisor, Ms. Gina Rye. On April 20th through April 23rd, our two teams: the TV (Video) Production team with David Heras (9th grader) and Karl Zieber (12th grader); and the Entrepreneurship team with Matthew Banks (12), Christian Ortiz (11), Salvador Villalpando (12), and Miguel Rodriguez (12), were required to complete project tasks over multiple days, facing a number of other teams from across the state. Recap: Our teams advanced to the state level after earning a silver medal for TV (Video) Production, and a bronze medal for Entrepreneurship at the regional competition this past January. Notable mention: Matthew Banks placed sixth out of 39 students in the Job Interview contest at Regionals!

Skills USA continued



In the time period between regionals and state competitions, our teams worked diligently to prepare industry-standard projects that fulfilled their contests requirements. Each project was written to measure multiple aspects of job-related technical and soft skills including: project and time management; goal-setting; teamwork and collaboration; written and verbal communication; problem solving; and industry-specific knowledge. Our Entrepreneurship team, which included four students from both Riverside's Pathfinder and Temecula student centers, met weekly over countless hours collaborating via Google Hangouts and Google Docs to prepare their competition project mentored by their CTE instructors, Ms. Rye (Pathfinder) and Rosario Marquez (Temecula). The team was tasked to write and present a complete business plan for a fictional business. At their contest, each member contributed equally to the project and were able to experience what it is like to actually present a plan to potential investors.

Meanwhile, our TV (Video) Production team worked well together at the Temecula student center, mentored by CTE Theater Arts teacher, Robin Felix, in order to complete their project. The team did experience a change in members a month or so before the State championships when Karl Zieber stepped in to replace Grant Capua who originally competed at Regionals. Karl proved to be an invaluable asset to the team, as he quickly learned the contest requirements, cheerfully studied for the written exam, and contributed to the team's final video product.



On the final day of State Championships, an Olympic-style awards ceremony is held and first, second, and third place winners earn gold, silver, and bronze medals; gold medals advance to the National Championships, held in Louisville, Kentucky each June. Some of the contest winners are even awarded with prizes and/or cash. While neither of our teams ended up earning medals for their contests at State Championships this season, our teams walked away from the experience proud and with a sense of team accomplishment. State and National contests are measured by the highest standards and criteria, so our teams were able to gain priceless feedback from the industry professional judges and peers about their performances and products. Our students were surrounded by exemplary student leaders showcased in SkillsUSA state and national officers and alumni. Additionally, they took away camaraderie and friendship that comes with working together toward a common goal. Finally, our teams enjoyed a long weekend networking and socializing with a diversity of students from schools all over the state, as well as making professional connections with SkillsUSA professionals and technical committee members. Our SkillsUSA chapter at River Springs looks forward to growing our student leadership and competition teams so that we can return to SkillsUSA Championships in the years to come.
