








In Mrs. Martinez's class, students use a coordinate plane pegboard to solve a system of equations graphically.

Our middle and high school students have moved to our new building. All grades are now under one roof this year! The students were greeted by signs of Welcome Home! It is wonderful having all of us together.











Spelling Bee 2017: Congratulations to Joe Simmons 4th grader from Ms. Boytim's class. He's headed to our school-wide Springs' Bee.






