




Students spent the morning of April 26 expressing kindness to one another and reaching out to the community by joining hands for the "Hands Across Campus" global event.




















The small but mighty Otay Ranch Learning Center shared many things they learned this year with a fantastic Open House!


Our Mother-Son Dance was a hit! Thank you to the elementary school teachers for organizing and working to ensure everyone had a great time.
