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

On February 21<sup>st</sup>, students in the CTE Design, Visual, and Media Arts pathway at the Pathfinder Student Center were visited by the photographer and Magnolia Student Center alumnus, Daniel Rubio. Since graduating in 2017, Daniel has been photographing concerts and events, family portraits, commercial portraits, products, and lifestyle photography for brands and companies.

Daniel presented a slideshow portfolio of his professional work to the students and shared useful advice and insight into getting started as a photographer in the real world. He emphasized having a strong social media presence and not being afraid to reach out to businesses and people that interest you. Daniel's visit demonstrated to the CTE students that hard work and commitment could lead to a career following their passion.
















Happy to be in La Mirada! Today, we met these delightful eager artists on the first day of the new La Mirada Enrichment Center. They were introduced to famous paintings with

As part of Kindness Week, students and staff at ORAA created a paper chain of kindness!




and creative. The first place was for Rockland Menendez,

Because of the flexibility and support of Venture, she has been able to follow her interests to have real-world, hands-on experiences that take advantage of the rich educational opportunities in London. Along with her mother who teaches art, Rowan visited museums as part of her learning experience. Rowan has copied paintings she loves (such as Waterhouse's "Lady of Shallot" pictured below) on site in the National Gallery and Tate Britain museums. When she read Papa Piccolo for her Venture kindergarten literature curriculum, she was also to identify paintings of Venice in the National Gallery. The family tries to integrate various site visits with reading and experiential learning. When she was interested in pirates, they read Treasure Island and visited a replica of the Golden Hinde. Also, she studied maps of Sir Francis Drake's routes of exploration, learned about the Spanish Armada, and visited portraits of Drake and Queen Elizabeth I in the National Portrait Gallery. They made a treasure map and buried coins in the back garden. This year, Rowan has focused on science and natural history taking advantage of the many hands-on exhibits and artifacts at the Science and Natural History museums. When she spotted a parakeet out her living room window, they researched how these non-native birds arrived in London, learned about how they survive in the city, and about native predators that now use them as a food source. Rowan has done drawings of the birds and their new ecosystem. They also added worldclass performing arts education into this year's mix. Rowan takes dance and musical theater classes at home. While in London, she studies singing, acting, and dance at the Pineapple Performing Arts Academy in Covent Garden. Her teachers are West-End professionals.
