Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide students with a theoretical foundation and the practical skills to examine and alter their interpersonal communication. To accomplish this, students will master three areas central to effective communication. First, we use communication theory to view relationships in ways we may never have considered before. Second, we learn to observe, identify, and describe human behavior accurately. Finally, we learn when to use the right communication skill when needed most.

- 5 Reduce misunderstandings; manage conflicts effectively; get others to support ideas and follow instructions; increase social attraction; listen more effectively to increase information retention and increase relationship satisfaction; describe and apply fundamental language concepts to change work performance.

ESSAY QUIZZES (6 tests @ 140 points total): Some chapters have an essay quiz. These must be completed after finishing the reading and passing a Chapter Test for the same chapter. Students may attempt an essay quiz three times. After three attempts the highest score is recorded. Not all chapters have an essay quiz.

INTERPERSONAL COMMUNICATION CHANGE PROJECT (65 points possible): This project represents an organized program to improve a communication goal of your choice. Taking several weeks to complete, students use direct instruction, written practice, model observation, visualization, and rehearsal before implementing a communication goal.

DISCUSSION BOARD (20 points possible): Please read the discussion board prompt then respond in 200-300 words.
