Means of Assessment:

<u>Weekly Responses:</u> You are required to write **8** weekly responses out of the **10**-week quarter. These responses should be two *full* double spaced pages in length and should address the week's lecture, any documentaries viewed in class, and the week's readings. The purpose of

these responses is for students to show their understanding of how lecture, films, and readings come together. Responses should reflect on the major themes of the week. These are due Thursday nights to give students an opportunity to collect their thoughts on the week's information prior to Friday discussions.

<u>Discussion:</u> We will have weekly class discussions on the course readings and lecture. Discussion points cannot be made up so you must be present and prepared to earn these points.

- 1. Discussion days will consist of small group discussion followed by a large class discussion.
- 2. To receive the full points for discussion days your group will turn in a written account of your group's discussion. These must have full sentences and convey your group's conversation effectively. These are graded so make sure to put in the effort. These should include direct references to both the week's readings as well as tie in lecture material to demonstrate understanding of the materials. If it appears that that some students are not contributing, they will not receive discussion points for that day. Discussion day points cannot be made up.

<u>Essay:</u> This essay will be 4 full pages in length. The prompt and instructions for the essay will be distributed 2 weeks prior to the deadline.

Cold War History Research Project: Students will complete a 5-6-page research paper on the Cold War based on their own family history and academic research. To complete this research paper, you will need to conduct **oral history interviews with two family members** (over the age of 50). Questions are for you to decide, but they need to be focused and respectful of the interviewee's privacy. Questions must seek to ascertain the interviewees experience and memories of the Cold War period. Interviews may be done in person or by phone, NOT by email. Students will use **2** academic secondary sources, lecture material, and the two interviews.

<u>Final Exam</u>: The take home exam will consist of material covered in the second half of class. The exam is worth 200 points. The prompt and requirements will be distributed two weeks prior to the deadline.
